
want to be prepared to give COVID-19 vaccines?

here's a checklist.

As more points of care start providing COVID-19 vaccines to their patients, we want to make things a little easier for healthcare professionals like you by providing a list of key actions to consider as you prepare to administer COVID-19 vaccines.*





storage and handling

- Establish an ongoing ordering process for the number of vaccines needed at your facility
- Ensure you can meet proper temperature and space storage requirements for your anticipated supply
- Ensure vials are prepared according to the manufacturer fact sheets, and note the shelf-life for administration and the amount you will need for the day (to avoid waste)
- Check vaccine expiration dates and rotate vaccine supply so that older vaccines are used first
- ☐ **If you discover an error** with a vaccine (eg, an inappropriate dose or a dose that was not stored properly), take appropriate action according to your facility protocols and vaccine manufacturer guidance



before and during administration³

Establish where you'd like patients to wait prior to their appointments, and follow appropriate social distancing guidelines
Encourage patients to read about product information or FAQs while waiting—for a printable in-office poster, <u>click here</u>
Create a seating area to observe patients for side effects after receiving their vaccine; communicate the wait time to patients
Have all necessary equipment on hand as required by the CDC in the event of a severe allergic reaction. All vaccination providers should be trained to address life-threatening reactions
Double check the expiration date on all vaccine vials
Maintain the integrity of the vaccines as you fill syringes, noting if dilution is required
Be prepared to advise patients about possible adverse reactions to and side effects of the COVID-19 vaccines
Familiarize yourself with possible adverse reactions and how to report them through the Vaccine Adverse Event Reporting System (VAERS) • Encourage patients to sign up for VSAFE at their vaccination appointment
Consider how to advise patients about medications that may help alleviate adverse reactions and what to do if side effects become severe
Record all vaccine information , including date, location, lot numbers, and injection site, in the patients' records
Encourage staff to access resources to learn more about vaccinations, including the CDC, your state and local governments, and the NIH. See links below
